#### "GO TELL IT ON THE MOUNTAIN"

Dear friends in Christ.

As I rake the leaves in my yard and move them into the paper bags and to the curb for pickup, I am reminded that the seasons are definitely changing as we now prepare for the wintry days and nights in the not-too-distant future.

It is also a time of less sunlight in the Northern Hemisphere, with the darkest time of year occurring at the Winter Solstice, approximately December 21 — something that, for many, can contribute to natural feelings of sadness. The hymn has everything in it for the telling of the great story. There are shepherds, angels, the baby Jesus, the hills, and we are present right there in the midst of the singing of those wonderful words.

Our lives and our spirits are transformed once again by hearing the wonderful words of this spiritual. The last verse of the hymn tells the story of the shepherds as told in Luke 2: 8-20 and Matthew 28: 19, "Down

in a lowly manger, the humble Christ was born, and God sent us salvation, that blessed Christmas morn." The beloved hymn is the Annunciation (proclaiming the birth of Jesus) to the Shepherds as described in the Gospel of Luke, which is our story of telling the good news to all that we meet during this season and into the new year and at all times.

With everything that is happening in the world right now, my Christmas wish is for you and your respective family to remain safe, stay healthy and be mindful of God's most precious gift given for us at Christmas. There can be peace, there can be joy, there can be hope and love all due to the Prince of Peace who

has come for us. May it be so this Christmas time and for the new year. Let us always go and tell it on the mountain, for truly Jesus Christ is born, for me, for you and for all those that hear and live by the good news, now and forever. Amen.

Not a head-line you'd expect to read in a Calvary United Church newsletter, but this is about Calvary's Gift Card Program through Fundscrip.

After many months' deliberation, a decision has been made that it's time to end Calvary's participation in the program. We've had a long, successful run, raising an average of over \$3,000 each year from 2007 to 2019. Then the pandemic hit. With closures and broken ordering habits, our profits averaged out to \$800/year over the 3-year span from 2020 through 2022. We've never really recovered to our old levels of participation, but can't



blame it all on Covid. Much of it has to do with store loyalty programs, credit card bonus points, and general distrust of gift cards.

Our last two ordering dates for the gift cards are Sunday, November 26 and Sunday, December 10. A list of available cards can be found at fundscrip.com. Write your order on a slip of paper or print off an order form, accompanied by cash or cheque to "Calvary United Church" and either hand it to me or put it on the offering plate. I'll have your cards for you the following Sunday. Gift cards are great for teenagers, millennials (Amazon? or Best Buy?), or a small thank you (Tim Hortons? Indigo/Chapters?). Don't forget your own day-to-day purchases for groceries or gas too, and maybe even a little treat for yourself?

#### End of an Era

#### Calvary United Church Women – celebration of their work over the past 60 years.

Over the past 61 years, UCW has been an important group in the life of Calvary. You may have wondered what went on at their meetings and other activities. Prior to UCW the women served in either Women's Missionary Society who supported the missionary work of the United Church or the Women's Auxiliary who focused on the work of the local church and community.

The UCW's mission is to love God, foster Christian commitment, faithfulness, and spiritually, and promote respect and love for all God's creation. This mission has been embodied in the Calvary UCW in many ways. As the photo of the 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary banner illustrates, it was the work of many hands that made this possible.

We celebrate the UCW of Calvary, and especially recognize our remaining charter member, Isabel Hill, who like 91 other women were UCW members from the beginning in 1962. At that time, Calvary's UCW had six units who met during the day and one unit which met at night as these were the younger women who were working. There were about 25 women in each unit. The evening unit kept growing by mentoring younger women. As one of those members stated, "we had fun learning from each other as we took turns leading meetings".

We remember and give thanks for the women who accepted



leadership roles as Presidents, Secretaries. Treasurers and who filled other committee responsibilities. Over the years, UCW organized rummage sales, bazaars and other events with the help of members of the congregation. Since the late 60's a stewardship letter has been sent out to all the women of Calvary. In the beginning, a motion directed that the money contributed be used to support local agencies related to the United Church. In recent years. this was motion rescinded in order to support community agencies also.

The UCW remembers Calvary members with cards for special birthdays and anniversaries as well as bereavements. We appreciate the years that Jean Knowles fulfilled this responsibility, and we thank Miriam Admans and Kathi Barton who have continued in this role. UCW has made a donation to the Memorial and Special Projects Fund in memory of all Calvary members.

The National World Day of Prayer Service was first hosted by Calvary UCW members in 1964 and has continued on a rotating schedule with the other South London Churches. These services were prepared by women from a different country each year as a means of education and unity expressed in the worship customs and themes of the various nations.

As fellowship was important, unit meetings ended with a social time. A combined meeting of all units would happen in the Spring and at Christmas to enjoy either a social tea or luncheon. UCW also catered often for funeral luncheons as a way of supporting families in their grief.

As Calvary's UCW closes in December 2023, we wish to thank the many women for their dedication and long-term commitment to Calvary UCW. Since there are so many names that could be listed, only a few are included. Heart-felt gratitude goes to Pam Harrison Secretary/Treasurer, Christine Kussner Vice President, and Mary Margaret Farrow, Past President. We also thank Ruthanne McLagan, President, for her leadership in the past four years.

Thank you to these women and the many women, not named, for fulling the UCW purpose of uniting women of the congregation for the total mission of the church and providing a means through which we expressed our loyalty and devotion to Jesus Christ in Christian witness, study, fellowship and service.


#### **Bread not Stones**

## Canadian Foodgrains Bank 40th Anniversary Celebration



On November 2nd, over 100 supporters of Canadian Foodgrains Bank joined together to share a meal and celebrate the 40th anniversary of CFGB.

Henry Reinders, Ontario region representative welcomed everyone and spoke of the continued support of the federal government for CFGB, matching donations to a maximum of \$25 million. Christina Phillips, director of communications and public engagement, shared her experiences traveling to countries where CFGB, working with overseas partners, are having a profound impact. She shared stories of people facing starvation, but who found real iov when food and support was provided. Many stated that their faith in God helped them survive until emergency food supplies arrived.

Don Langford, a local Ontario farmer, who was instrumental in starting the CFG B program 40 years ago, spoke of the earliest days, when farmers came together to send grain from Canada to Ethiopia, Somalia and India.

Prior to the pandemic, the number of people facing starvation was on a downward trend. However, that trend has been reversed due to supply chain problems, conflict and climate change. The need to support is growing exponentially. At the end of the evening we joined in song, with the following refrain "Until all are fed Until all on earth have bread Like the One who loves us Each and everyone We serve until all are fed"
